RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:

This course meets the need for education students who would like to transfer to CCU's PPTe. Technology is a large part of education and our future educators need to be prepared to use technology to enrich their lessons. It is also required by the ISTE NETS that teachers use technology in their classrooms to help prepare students for the digital world they are entering. This course will demonstrate several tools that can be used in and out of the classroom.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course explores teaching as a data driven, reflective practice. Within the parameters of an approved articulation agreement, this course may transfer to an accredited Education program at a comprehensive four-year college or university.

GRADING SYSTEM:

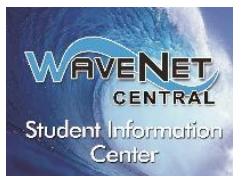
