### **RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:**

This course gives students an introduction to electronic data communications systems.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course is a study of the techniques for sending and receiving information. Topics include media characteristics, modulation/demodulation, signal conversions, multiplexing and demultiplexing, protocols, industrial standards, networks, and error detection and correction. Circuits are modeled, constructed and tested.

### **PREREQUISITES/CO-REQUISITES:**

  - 2.2. Frequency shift keying (FSK)
  - 2.3. Phase shift keying (PSK)
3. Quadrature Amplitude Modulation (QAM)
4. Analyze demodulation techniques for both analog and digital systems.

5. Identify noise sources and describe signal-to-noise ratio.

### **Module 3**

**Materials Covered:** Analyze optical and cellular communication systems.

**Assessments:** homework, lab exercises, unit test

**Learning Outcomes:**

1. Describe optical communication systems components.
2. Analyze optical fiber transmission properties.
3. Describe optical system signal and noise levels.
4. Identify multiplexing and demultiplexing techniques
5. Describe cellular telephone concepts.
