- The student will then write a proposal of the selected project idea, including expected results and performance specifications, along with any related published materials, to be submitted to the instructor for approval.

#### **UNIT 2 – PARTS PROCUREMENT**

- Upon receipt of approval, the student will procure required parts from the necessary sources.
- Weekly written updates are to be provided by the student.

#### **UNIT 3 – ASSEMBLY AND TEST**

- The student will assemble and test his project to determine if it meets projected results.
- Weekly written updates are to be provided by the student.

#### **UNIT 4 – DOCUMENTATION AND DEMONSTRATION**

- The student will write a project report in correct format and grammar.
- Discuss theory of operation of the project.
- Analyze and evaluate project performance versus design specifications.
- The student will prepare and give verbal presentation describing the project and results.
- The student will demonstrate function of the project.

#### **GRADING SYSTEM:**

A: 90-100

HGTC has a standardized, recommended grading scale for academic courses. The grading scale requires that grades within the indicated range be defined as follows:

D: 60-69

F: Below 60

The following grades are used:

B: 80-89

A - EXCELLENT: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 4 quality points and earns credit hours.

C: 70-79

- B ABOVE AVERAGE: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 3 quality points and earns credit hours.
- C AVERAGE: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 2 quality points and earns credit hours.
- D BELOW AVERAGE: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 1 quality point and earns credit hours.
- F FAILURE: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 0 quality points and earns 0 credit hours. (Hours attempted are used in GPA calculations.)
- I INCOMPLETE: does not affect GPA calculations; defaults to "F" automatically after one term if the incomplete work has not been completed and generates 0 quality points and 0 credit hours. (See special note below.)
- WF WITHDRAWN FAILURE: used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 0 quality points and earns 0 credit hours. (Hours attempted are used in GPA calculations.)
- W WITHDRAW: not used in GPA calculations; carries a value of 0 quality points and earns 0 credit hours. May be utilized when extenuating circumstances warrant.

Note: Regarding a grade of "I" (Incomplete): A grade of Incomplete ("I") is assigned when the student does not complete work or take the final exam due to illness or for other reasons over which the student has no control. This grade is given only with the approval of the professor involved. An incomplete must be completed by the end of the following term. Otherwise, the grade becomes an automatic failure ("F").

Grades earned in courses impact academic progression and financial aid status. Before withdrawing from a course, be sure to talk with your instructor and financial aid counselor about the implications of that course of action. Ds, Fs, Ws, WFs and Is also negatively impact academic progression and financial aid status.

The Add/Drop Period is the first 5 days of the semester for **full term** classes. Add/Drop periods are shorter for accelerated format courses. Please refer to the academic calendar for deadlines for add/drop (<u>ACADEMIC</u> <u>CALENDAR</u>). You must attend at least one meeting of all of your classes during that period. If you do not, you will be dropped from the course(s) and your Financial Aid will be reduced accordingly.

#### Part IV: Attendance

Horry-Georgetown Technical College maintains a general attendance policy requiring students to be present for a minimum of eighty percent (80%) of his or her classes in order to be eligible to receive credit for any course. However, due to the varied nature of courses taught at the College, a more rigid attendance policy may be required by individual instructors. At a minimum, a student may be withdrawn from a course(s) after he or she has been absent in excess of ten percent (10%) of the total contact hours for a course.
