### **RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:**

World Geography is designed to provide students with an awareness of today's complex and interrelated globe. Students will also develop a spatial perspective for local, regional, and world topics. They will learn to bring focus and understanding to the variances between undeveloped countries and developed countries. And they will examine the processes that have shaped the different regions of the world.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course includes a geographic analysis of the regions of the world, i.e., North and South America, Europe, Australia, Asia and Africa. Diversity of each region is emphasized by examining its physical environment, natural resources, social, cultural, economic and political systems.

Grades earned in courses impact academic progression and financial aid status. The Add/Drop Period is the first 5 days of the semester for **full term** classes. Add/Drop periods are shorter for accelerated format courses. If you do not, you will be dropped from the course(s) and your Financial Aid will be reduced accordingly.

## Part IV: Attendance

Horry-Georgetown Technical College maintains a general attendance policy requiring students to be present for a minimum of 80 percent (80%) of their classes in order to receive credit for any course. Due to the varied nature of courses taught at the college, some faculty may require up to 90 percent (90%) attendance. Pursuant to 34 Code of Federal Regulations 228.22 - Return to Title IV Funds, once a student has missed over 20% of the course or has missed two (2) consecutive weeks, the faculty is
