### RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:

It's difficult to predict exactly how you might respond during a crisis. Yet, as a human service worker, you may face challenging behavior and potentially dangerous situations every day. How you respond greatly determines the safety of everyone involved and profoundly impacts the relationships with those in your care. This course helps equip students with communication and intervention skills that can make a difference in the outcome of the situation.

### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a study of the effects of crisis on people, the methods of intervention, and other use of multiple resources to reestablish individual function. Students are required to demonstrate mock crisis activities.
