RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:

This course introduces the student to the basic pharmacological interventions for common pathologies and conditions exhibited by massage therapy clients. It addresses how particular injuries, syndromes, diseases, and conditions respond to pharmacological interventions.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course studies the effects of medications commonly reported on health intake forms by massage clients. Topics include common over-the-counter pain relievers, NSAIDS, and medications for cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Emphasis is placed on possible contradications for massage therapy.
