**RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:** The course is designed to provide students with a basic understanding of the techniques used to manage wildlife. The student will be instructed on the safe and efficient use of the many tools used in the science of wildlife management.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course includes a survey of applied techniques of wildlife management. The course covers "hands on" instruction in the outdoors. Emphasis is on the programs and practices of modern habitat management, evaluation of wildlife populations, and understanding land management recommendations. Attention will be given to wildlife identification, techniques to evaluate wildlife health, and writing/reading wildlife management plans. Additionally, students will be introduced to wildlife harvest techniques.
