COURSE TITLE: Wildlife Management and Techniques

CONTACT HOURS: 2.0 Lecture, 3.0 Lab

CREDIT HOURS: 3.0 Credits

RATIONALE FOR THE COURSE:

This course introduces students to concepts such as population dynamics, carrying capacities, landscape fragmentation, wildlife census techniques and wildlife management techniques such as predator culls, habitat modification, captive breeding and release as well as examine the relationship between wildlife management and the law.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a basic study and application of management and monitoring practices which are beneficial to wildlife. Methods for increasing food production, developing water sources, providing cover requirements, applied techniques of wildlife management and improving wetlands are included.

PREREQUISITES/CO-REQUISITES:

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES and ASSESSMENTS*:

Module #1 Materials Covered: Introduction to Wildlife Management and Ecology *Assessment(s): Class Participation, Labs, Unit Test

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Understand basic terms: preservation, conservation, management, carrying capacity, limiting factors, fragmentation, diversity.
- 2. Explain the purpose of wildlife management.
- 3. Identify human dimensions of wildlife management.
- 4. Understand the role of ethics in wildlife science.
- 5. Describe the relationship of federal and state regulations for game and nongame species.
- 6. Understand ecology (mutualism, commensalism, competition, predation, parasitism, herbivory) and the techniques for analyzing wildlife ecology data.
- 7. Explain food webs (Derital web, Grazing web, trophic levels).

Module #2

Materials Covered: Wildlife Habitats *Assessment(s): Class Participation, Labs, Unit Test

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Describe major habitats of SC and wildlife that exist in them.
- 2. Describe how commercial forest management impacts wildlife.
- 3. Explain how changes to habitat affect wildlife (physical, biological, pollution)
- 4. Identify common techniques for vegetation sampling and measurement.
- 5. Learn how to measure wildlife nutrition.
- 6. Use geospatial technologies for wildlife studies.
- 7. Ability to write habitat recommendations for game and nongame wildlife species.

Module #3

Materials Covered: Population Dynamics

*Assessment(s): Class Participation, Labs, Unit Test

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Explain the components of a population (fecundity, mortality, growth rates)
- 2. Use life tables (cohort or dynamic, static or time specific)
- 3. Explain carrying capacity and exponential population growth.
- 4. Identify diseases and health risks for deer, turkey, and quail.
- 5. Identify risk factors and symptoms of transferable wildlife diseases to humans.
- 6. Examine fisheries stock management and methods (stock identification, assessment, biomass)

Module #4 Materials Covered: Wildlife Censuses *Assessment(s): Class Participation, Labs, Unit Test

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Explain animal ethics
- 2. Identify different census types: total, sampling
- 3. Understand accuracy versus precision and bias errors
- 4. Identify and conduct direct and indirect methods: aerial surveys, trapping, transects, mark-recapture, call counts
- 5. Learn how to use remote cameras and bioacoustics to monitor wildlife.
- 6. Understand how to conduct a population analysis.
- 7. Understand how to use radar and UAVs to survey wildlife.

Module #5

Materials Covered: Wildlife Management Techniques *Assessment(s): Class Participation, Labs, Unit Test

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Explain how common habitat modification techniques benefit wildlife (fire, vegetation management, role of food plots, invasive species)
- 2. Understand how predator control, hunting, and captive breeding/release affect wildlife populations.
- 3. Explain how different control techniques affect a population (manipulating mortality, fertility, genetic engineering, and other indirect methods)
- 4. Understand the role of adaptive management in wildlife conservation.
- 5. Identify common techniques in managing forestland, rangeland, wetlands and farmland for wildlife species.
- 6. Understand the most common techniques for managing terrestrial invasive species.

Module #6 Materials Covered: Wildlife Management Project Based Learning *Assessment(s): Management Plan

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Identify the objectives of a management program for a species
- 2. Determine appropriate techniques for carrying out a census of the species
- 3. Identify techniques for increasing the population of the species
- 4. Present a management plan in a form that is appropriate for use by wildlife workers.
