This Course continues the development of the basic language skills and the study of Hispanic cultures.

- 2. Conjugate verbs grammatically which have stem changes and irregular 1st person conjugations.
- 3. Demonstrate the function and syntax of types of words such as direct and indirect object pronouns, demonstrative adjectives and pronouns.
- 4. Offer information referring to future actions.
- 5. Express reflexive constructions about themselves and others.
- 6. Address Spanish speakers using simple past tenses.
- 7. Incorporate idiomatic expressions into Spanish conversation.
- 8. Discuss the weather incorporating world geography as occurs in natural conversation.

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- 9. Ask and offer basic personal information changing from present to past and future constructions as occurs in natural conversation.
- 10. Demonstrate their appreciation of diversity and mutual respect towards others by establishing common likes and dislikes.

GRADING SYSTEM:

Please note the College adheres to a 10 point grading scale A = 100 - 90, B = 89 - 80, C = 79 - 70, D = 69 - 60, F = 59 and below. You must have your Dean's approval if changes in the scale are made.

Grades earned in courses impact academic progression and financial aid status. Before withdrawing from a course, be sure to talk with your instructor and financial aid counselor about the implications of that course of action. Ds, Fs, Ws, WFs and Is also negatively impact academic progression and financial aid status.

The Add/Drop Period is the first 5 days of the semester for **full term** classes. Add/Drop periods are shorter for accelerated format courses. Please refer to the academic calendar for deadlines for add/drop (<u>ACADEMIC CALENDAR</u>). You must attend at least one meeting of all of your classes during that period. If you do not, you will be dropped from the course(s) and your Financial Aid will be reduced accordingly.

Part IV: Attendance

Horry-Georgetown Technical College maintains a general attendance policy requiring students to be present for a minimum of 80 percent (80%) of their classes in order to receive credit for any course. Due to the varied nature of courses taught at the college, some faculty may require up to 90 percent (90%) attendance. Pursuant to 34 Code of Federal Regulations 228.22 - Return to Title IV Funds, once a student has missed over 20% of the course or has missed two (2) consecutive weeks, the faculty is obligated to withdraw the student and a student may not be permitted to reenroll. Instructors define absentee limits for their class at the beginning of each term; please refer to the Instructor Course Information Sheet.

Please note, instructors may require tests to be taken at approved testing sites, if you use a testing center other than those provided by HGTC, the center may charge a fee for its services.
